


What draws customers so feverishly to such expensive and highmaintenance pets? It may be that aquariums are not really in the
category of pets at all. The most elaborate and high-end aquariums
could truly be categorized as art – living art. Artist and aquatic
installation specialist Richard Bilow of Aqua-Terra Studios recently
contributed to one such extreme project in Montecito where the usual
tropical coral was replaced by a magnificent seascape composed of
volcanic rock and hand-blown glass sculptures. Bilow says. "I approach
aquarium design as a multi-dimensional form of fine art. This allows me
to avoid preconceived assumptions about aquariums, which typically




